#### **Purpose:**

The purpose of the Trainee Award - Network for Improving Health Systems LDFP and DLSPH Partnership is to build capacity in health services and policy research focused on improving the health care system, and in particular, research that is aimed at understanding a larger role for pharmacists and an expanded healthcare system that includes pharmacists.

#### **Eligibility:**

The program is open to all full-time research-stream graduate students (MSc and PhD) in the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences or the Dalla Lana School of Public Health (Public Health Sciences or Institute for Health Policy Management and Evaluation). Students must be supervised by faculty who hold associate (for MSc students) or full (for MSc or PhD students) graduate faculty membership with the School of Graduate Studies and graduate appointments in either the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences at the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy or the Dalla Lana School of Public Health at the University of Toronto. The supervisor must be eligible to hold tri-council agency funds (e.g. CIHR, SSHRC or NSERC). Materials from both the trainee and supervisor are required for this application (submitted together).

The Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy and the Dalla Lana School of Public Health recognize that diversity is essential to the creation of a vibrant intellectual community that allows our researchers to maximize their creativity and their contributions.

### Funding and Value of the Award:

The value of the Trainee Award - Network for Improving Health Systems award is up to \$25,000 for 1 year. It is expected that ten applications will be awarded in 2022-23 (to be used in 2023-24) and ten applications will be awarded in 2023-24 (to be used in 2024-25). A trainee is only eligible to be funded once every two years (i.e., cannot be funded two years in a row) through this competition.

Funds awarded will be applied as follows:

For an MSc or PhD student:

- This award will count towards the awardee's funding package, and will be eligible for any bonuses as described in the appropriate graduate unit funding policy;

This call for proposals is supported by the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy and the Dalla Lana School of Public Health in collaboration with Shoppers Drug Mart (SDM). The University of Toronto is responsible for managing the funding and funds shall be awarded at the discretion of the Dean of the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy and the Dean of the Dalla Lana School of Public Health, based on recommendations made by the peer review committee that will be reviewing applications.

### Competition Deadline:

The deadline for receipt of applications is **June 15, 2023**.

### Application Content:

The application must consist of the following sections:

1.0 Title and Lay Abstract (no more than ½ page)

2.0 Training Program Description (no more than 1 page)

3.0 Research Proposal (no more than 3 pages for content excluding references plus no more than 1 page for references)

4.0 Trainee CV (in the format of the Canadian Common CV; CIHR Academic)

5.0 Supervisor Letter of Commitment to Support the Trainee and Research Proposed (no more than 2 pages)

All components of the application should be submitted together in one document (ideally PDF format). Applications should describe, in language suitable for a non-specialist audience, the new and/or emerging area(s) to be addressed. Competitive applications will address the following:

- A concept that addresses program objectives and purpose (see above);
- The rationale for the proposed study and the potential impact of the expected results;
- Inclusion of internal and/or external partners (including co-applicants, collaborators and/or other institutions within government or the private sector).

Trainee projects need to address the areas of focus listed below.

LDFP allocation	<p>All funded trainees must have proposed projects that meet at least two of the criteria listed below.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Identifies gaps in care that could benefit from low acuity or other services that could be met by community-based pharmacists working on their own or as part of a larger clinical team;</li> <li>• Evaluates implementation of existing pharmacist centred services or new pharmacist-led approaches that better integrate community pharmacists into the primary healthcare system including monitoring/follow-up;</li> <li>• Demonstrates the effect of care by community-based pharmacy teams on patient reported outcome or experience measures</li> <li>• Includes an approach for community-based pharmacists to electronically receive data from or electronically share data with patients or other health care providers including patient self-report, diagnostic, laboratory or other clinical data;</li> <li>• Addresses socio-cultural considerations related to pharmacy practice.</li> </ul> <p>All trainees funded must be working on proposals that collaborate with the <a href="#">Discovery Pharmacy</a> as an implementation or evaluation site, participant recruitment site, or a knowledge user. DLSPH allocation	<p>All funded trainees must have proposed projects that address at least one of the areas listed below:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• The larger role for pharmacists and an expanded public health and healthcare system that includes pharmacists;</li> <li>• Policy analysis of issues in integrating community-based pharmacists into integrated care teams / broader health care</li> </ul>

	<p>system, including studies of the role of data, data sharing, emerging ethical issues, integrating datasets, identification and monitoring of population-based care needs/gaps;</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Evaluation of pharmacist health human resource needs in Ontario;</li> <li>• Systems level demonstration of approaches to identify, monitor or address population-based care needs/gaps that could be managed by community-based pharmacists;</li> <li>• Economic evaluation of existing pharmacist centred services or new pharmacist-led approaches that better integrate community pharmacists into the primary healthcare system.</li> </ul> <p>Within the funding envelope and if project proposals are considered fundable in peer review, one project will be funded that:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• New data science methods, approaches, or applications to inform policy changes in relation to primary care</li> </ul>
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**Application Review:**

Members of the professorial staff within the Leslie Dan Faculty of Pharmacy, the Dalla Lana School of Public Health and individuals external to the Faculties and/or University will review all applications. To be successful, applicants must write their applications for non-specialist reviewers.

**Evaluation Criteria:**

Applications will be assessed according to four criteria. The onus is on the applicant to address each criterion in the application. These include:

1. Strength of training program proposed (using CIHR fellowship award criteria <https://cihr-irsc.gc.ca/e/26720.html>) (20%)
2. Merits of the proposal (including significance, methodology, measurable outcomes, feasibility and expected impact); (40%)
3. How well the proposal addresses the preferential consideration criteria (20%)
4. Trainee accomplishments to date based on level of trainee thus far (20%)

**Reporting Requirements:**

The recipient of the award will be required to submit a 1-page report (template to be provided) to the LDSP Research Office at the end of the year detailing accomplishments in their training and project.

**Collaboration and Knowledge Translation Expectations:**

The recipient will be expected to

- agree to have the recipient name, picture and brief summary of research profiled on the Network for Improving Health System webpages;

- present their research methods or results at one of the planned purposely focused Network events to be held in the Fall 2023 or Spring 2024, where applicable these events will be cohosted by the Ontario Pharmacy Evidence Network;
- work with LDFP and DLSPH communications to highlight aspects of the research when requested;
- work with Centre for Practice Excellence and Ontario Pharmacy Evidence Network administrative staff to develop purposeful documents aimed at helping inform policy makers and the public about plans for the research and findings generated by the research.
